YEAR 10 TRIP TO THE TATE MODERN & **BOROUGH MARKET**

At the start of the Year 10 GCSE journey in September, an inspirational trip was enjoyed that delivered a combinaton of the world of contemporary art with the flavors and visuals of one of London's most iconic food markets.

Students were given the opportunity to experience two must-visit destinations in the city: Tate Modern and Borough Market. From groundbreaking art to irresistible culinary treats and displays, the day provided the perfect blend of creativity, inspiration, and indulgence.

Tate Modern, housed in a former power station along the River Thames, stands as one of the world's most renowned museums of modern art. The vast, industrial space creates an inspiring experience for many students who are visiting an art gallery for the first time. Upon entering, visitors are immediately struck by the soaring ceilings and the



imposing Turbine Hall, a space that has hosted some of the most daring and experimental art installations in the world.

The students were given the freedom to explore the permanent collections in small groups, allowing them to discover iconic works by artists like Pablo Picasso, Mark Rothko, and Georgia O'Keeffe more cutting-edge pieces by Damien Hirst and Yayoi Kusama. them and reflect on why these pieces spoke to them. In addition to exploring the galleries, students were asked to sketch their favourite pieces and capture images to spark their creativity back in the classroom.

After being immersed in the world of contemporary art, the next stop was the stunning Borough Market. Just a short walk from Tate Modern, this vibrant food market has been a cherished part of London's culture since the 13th century. Borough Market is not just about food—it's about the

experience of being surrounded by the sights, smells, and sounds of a bustling food scene. The market's array of gourmet treats, street food, and artisan products provided the perfect environment for students to gather ideas for their GCSE Food and Drink project.

Students were encouraged to explore the market's displays, try different foods, and immerse themselves in the atmosphere. The variety of smells—freshly baked bread, sizzling meats, and aromatic spices—created an unforgettable sensory experience. They were tasked to take as many photos as possible of the colourful stalls and artistic food displays, as well as sketch any items that inspired them.

At Borough Market, students could interact with local stallholders and discover weird and wonderful foods that spark their creativity. The combination of food, design, and atmosphere at the market becomes a direct inspiration for their GCSE projects.


A-LEVEL ART STUDENTS RISE TO THE CHALLENGE...

This Autumn Term the Art department welcomed a dynamic new cohort of Year 12 students, who have already blown us away. From experimental springboarding to sustained graphite drawing, print and textile workshops, and a series of two-week challenges, the students have embraced every opportunity with energy and enthusiasm. The department has been abuzz with incredible outcomes and the emergence of exciting new personal projects, showcasing the students' boundless creativity and passion for their work.

The recent Matchbox Challenge asked students to transform a humble matchbox into a compelling piece of art, using any materials or techniques they desired. Inspired by renowned artists such as Joseph Cornell and Cas Holmes, students were encouraged to think outside the box - literally and figuratively - while exploring their own personal project themes. The brief emphasized unrestricted creativity, prompting participants to stitch, paint, print, sculpt, and illustrate their pieces.

The outcomes showcased remarkable creativity and diversity. Themes ranged from water scarcity to love, with one student incorporating poetry into their design. Highlights included an ode to Blur in the form of a meticulously crafted music cassette, a baby memory box capturing the essence of adolescence, the celebration of a war hero & a Tim Burton inspired abandoned sweetshop. Each piece reflected thoughtful exploration and artistic depth, with students articulating their ideas and processes during a final crit lesson.

Meanwhile, our year 13's have been casting, etching, weaving and painting their way towards final outcome ideas for their component 1 projects. Projects include focuses on architecture, Japanese culture & printing,

DEPARTMENT OF CLASSICS AND POLITICAL SCIENCES - EXAMINATION TRIUMPHS 2024

This department offers A-Levels in three subjects: Ancient History, Politics and Law. 2024 represented one of our most successful years ever: according to the Headteacher's report to the Board of Trustees, Law was the best performing of the school's 28 sixth form subjects, Ancient History was the third-best performing, and Politics

Ancient History now has a 100% record for its students achieving Grade C or higher in the six years since the current syllabus was introduced.

The Law results were truly spectacular with our centre's grades exceeding national average for all grades as shown in the diagram right:



The show itself was played to 270 very noisy and wonderful primary school students who booed and cheered and joined in the singing. It is always lovely to see this performance. Then to the evening performances.


The cast were amazing and the many, many positive comments from the audience were lovely to hear and as I have said this is not just from parent and carers of the cast but from varied sources.


I hope every student and staff member involved in some way will treasure the memories of a wonderful production.

Parents' and Carers Book Club


If you love reading or want some inspiration and lively book discussion, then the GMS Book Club is for you!

YEAR 11 GEOGRAPHY FIELD TRIP

On Friday the 4th of October, the geography department, and the year 11 GCSE geography students travelled to Swanage. Here we studied fieldwork skills for our paper 3 exam.

We arrived early at Great Marlow and caught two coaches- headed south to our destination. After a long 3-hour journey- we had arrived. Once off the coach we split into class groups and tested different techniques and fieldwork skills. My group- with Miss Ashby- started on Swanage Beach and tested longshore drift, pebble

classification and the landscape gradient. Longshore drift was tested by throwing an apple far into the sea- we then set a timer for 5 minutes and watched how far the apples travelled. After finishing all 3 fieldwork techniques we investigated on the beach- we walked the lovely journey up the cliff; this was a two hour walk up and along the beautiful coastline of Swanage Bay. At the top of the cliff, we were able to overlook Swanage town and draw a landmark sketch of the towns building, groynes on the beach and the pier stretching out to the sea. We also saw Old Harry's Rock (an example of a crack, cave, arch, stack, stump) that we used for evidence of coastal processes

for our Swanage Bay case study. We continued to walk down the cliff and around the headland and continued to the next bay, where we found our coaches and left Swanage after an amazing trip. Overall, it was a great day- that was very informative to all the GCSE students preparing for the paper 3 fieldwork exam- yet was

exciting and interactive. Swanage was beautiful, and all of year 11 learnt a lot from the trip.

Year 13 Yorkshire trip- Crandale centre

After 6 hours on a coach, accompanied by 3 geography teachers (Miss Miles, Miss Coates and Miss Ashby) and Mr Bradley (an English teacher who tried his best to fit in with the GMS Geog Squad Seniors) we made it to

the Cranedale centre. When we arrived and had a guided tour of the facilities we would be staying in. After our tour we piled into the minibuses and went off to the coast! We had the chance to walk through caves and arches and next to stacks and stumps, developing our knowledge of coastal landforms and erosional processes. With a special appearance from the infamous flambasaurus-rex, we were off to a great start on our four-day trip!

On Saturday after a well needed sleep, and a full range of breakfast choices, we headed into Scarborough to assess deprivation, coastal tourism, and rebranding. We trekked through the town taking notes

on the cuisine, taking readings on a place wheel, and we created a word picture for several different locations of what we could see, smell and how the atmosphere felt towards us. We all had plenty of independent



time to explore the town, including the arcades and the tourist shops. All the knowledge from Scarbrough was assisted by our learning of the changing spaces, making places content from Year

On Sunday we compared an area of forest to an area of fields, measuring soil moisture, plant density, ground temperatures and carbon in the tree which is linked to the water and carbon cycle unit. We also measured the stream flow and the width of the river at three different locations at the river. We enjoyed our lunch between some Bridestones. We saw many animals, including a lizard!

On Monday we were given a mystery bucket which contained 4 different pieces of geographical equipment and tasked to create our own mini-NEA. We applied all the techniques we had learnt over the course of our stay to complete this. We

> explored the local village Kirby-Grindalythe, and gathered our own data, and then we headed back to the centre to analyse this using statistical tests.

Before loading back onto the coach and beginning our very long journey



home a very serious conservation needed to happen with the #geogsquadsenior members. This was to decide if Mr Bradley could become a GMS Geog Squad member. After a very intense questioning and a panel of Geog squad members, it was decided Mr Bradley could become a Geog squad member and he would receive a certificate for all his outstanding knowledge (2 months later and Mr Bradley still hasn't received it). One has to question, does he really have what it takes to be a fully-fledged Geog Squad member?!

YEAR 13 HAD A GREAT DAY EXPLORING HAMPTON COURT PALCE AND GROUNDS

The Year 13 A-level History students visited Hampton Court Palace as part of their early modern studies. We spent the day exploring the palace grounds and how it became the seat of power during Henry VIII's reign. In the morning, we had an expert led session on the mid-Tudor Crisis using the palace as a historical source. The students got fully involved in the session and they used the architecture and sources to greatly contribute to the group discussion.

Whilst at the palace we observed Wolsey's desire to show off his classical knowledge and cultural sophistication with the palace exterior which is adorned with Roman emperors. We saw how the palace is really divided into two halves, Tudor and Georgian. The latter being built in the image of the Palace of Versailles. We learnt the origin of the word eavesdropper through some rather creepy faces hidden in the ceiling of the Great Hall and how the court functioned whilst at the palace. We also found out that despite Jayne Seymour dying at Hampton Court Palace after the birth of Edward VI and her body being buried at Windsor, her heart remains in the chapel at Hampton Court.

Aside from our examination of the palace as a historical source, the students were also interested to learn what parts of the palace had been used in recent films and TV programmes. Unfortunately, there was not time to tackle Hampton Court's historic maze, but we enjoyed the unexpected sunshine and had a lovely day, walking in the footsteps of some of England's most famous monarchs. The day served as a reminder that all that separates us from the past is time and not space.







We have a strong tutor team who monitor uniform, achievement points and behaviour points and are the first point of contact with home alongside our excellent Student Support Officer, Miss Blanco-Rand. I am so grateful for the hard work and discretionary efforts of the year 8 pastoral team, in ensuring that the cohort's transition into Year 8 has been a positive and smooth process. The team continues to work closely with the SEN team, our Pupil Premium Coordinator Mrs Gifford and Heads of Department.

I would like to take this opportunity to highlight the important work of the Nurture Group, led by the wonderful Mrs Black and Mrs Samaras. This pilot scheme aims to provide a safe and supportive environment for students to develop positive relationships and self-esteem. The group runs three mornings a week and aims to set up select students for the day and week ahead. Feedback from students and parents from the first rotation has been overwhelmingly positive. A big thank you to Mrs Black and Mrs Samaras; your time, patience and care is so appreciated by the year 8 cohort. In addition, I would like to thank the wonderful Year 12 Sixth form mentors. The mentoring scheme launched in mid-November 2024 and feedback from students and parents has been overwhelmingly positive so far. I am excited to see the positive and sustained impact that the scheme will have on a number of Y8 students over the course of the academic year.

Parents and carers received the Year 8 progress reports on Friday 29th November. I hope that the progress reports have helped to facilitate useful discussions at home regarding student progress and possible areas for improvement. Year 8 tutors have set aside time in tutor time for reflection and in-depth progress report analysis considering individual student successes, areas for development and to identify common trends and patterns on their progress reports. 45 students in the year group will receive positive postcards from their tutor or Director of Learning, on account of an excellent first progress report of the academic year!



Year 7




This tournament was not only a testament to the players' footballing talent but also to their commitment to teamwork and respect for the game.

Girls' Football Project

Great Marlow School is continuing to work alongside the FA to grow and expand girls' football. The project, funded by Barclays, is developing more and more equal opportunities for girls and boys alike to play football with friends, for fun, and competitively. Through this infrastructure, we aim to develop innovative ways to deliver football for girls- improving participation from their very first experience. The aim of the programme is to create an active and confident generation of inspired female footballers. The programme has contributed to providing equal access for girls playing football in both the curriculum and as an extra-curricular club. Within the school curriculum, 80% of partnership schools have provided equal access through football lessons, and 93% of schools have provided opportunities through extra-curricular sport. This has increased our overall area success in achieving equal gender opportunity.









OUTDOOR HOCKEY

With many of the Year 8s and 9s not having much hockey playing experience before attending GMS, the girls have had to work incredibly hard to catch up with their local rivals in the county. And catch up, they have! Despite the challenges presented to them in year 7, with several tough fixtures, the girls' commitment to training and constant enthusiasm for the sport has enabled them to, this year, compete and win some games in the county championships.

GU16 – Regional Finalists

The U16 team have had a fantastic first half of a season and have shown demonstrated how much progress they have made since they joined GMS in Year 7. During the first round of the County Championships the team, once again the only state secondary upper entering, saw off opposition from Stowe School, Pipers Corner, Royal Latin and Aylesbury High school. The team finally seemed to have rid their U14 curse of not being able to score, by netting a total 13 goals throughout the tournament, with goal keepers Isla and Jess, playing their part too, by keeping clean sheets in all four games. Naturally this meant that the team didn't drop a single point all day, thus qualifying for the South-Central Finals in first place.

In a very competitive U14 Regional Finals, the GMS squad

played well throughout their three group matches. The first was tight game, played against The Oratory, where the GMS team dominated the both halves, really testing the opposition's defence, but struggled to find the back of the net. Unfortunately, despite GMS's late but deserved breakthrough to go 1-0 up, the Oratory equalised against the run of play, with the last touch of the game.

One of the best things about this group is their positivity and resilience, which is a large part of how they have come to compete at such a high level in the first place. The team were determined to end on a high and come away with a podium finish. To do so they would need to beat Churchers, who narrowly beat them at the U14 South-Central Finals last year. Time for redemption! The team played out of their skin, demonstrating their ability to employ more advanced tactics, yet still get the basics right. Churchers hardly saw the ball. The team came away with a dominant victory, with the GMS captain, Evie, scoring in her final competitive U16 fixture for GMS.

The whole day was extremely rewarding, with the students showcasing the progress they had made since beginning their hockey journeys at GMS. From winning one game in their county tournament in Year 7, to finishing in 3rd place at the Regional Finals three years later, this group has come such a long way. The development of life-skills facilitated through PE has been a core strand of our ethos with the GMS PE Department for the past 7 years. Where possible we use leadership as a vehicle to develop these much-needed life-skills to prepare our students for life beyond GMS.

During lesson time all students are given the opportunity to be a captain and lead small groups of their peers. This invaluable experience is the beginning of this development. Organisation, people management, communication, delegation, empathy are just some of the skills which the students begin to grasp during this opportunity. The next stage/ phase is leading at a School Games event. Primary school sporting events are held at

GMS throughout the year. Our students are trained and then lead on the day, ensuring all of the primary students know what they are doing in any event, which ensure that the event runs as smoothly as possible.

New for September 2024, all year 11 students have been completing a PE Life-Skills Award (PELSA) through their core PE lessons. This award, which is accredited by the Leadership Skills Foundation in partnership with The Youth Sports Trust, fits perfectly with the Sport Education programme which we have been running successfully at GMS for 7 years. The format of these core PE lessons facilitates the development of leadership through the students (group of 4) planning, organising and then delivering a sports session of their choice. This is then appraised by the class and teacher against 6 key life-skills as a criteria.

The final opportunity which we offer is the Level 3 Sports Leaders Course. This is also accredited by the Leadership Skills Foundation in partnership with The Youth Sports Trust. The award enables the students to become independent leaders of sports activities, and further develops their understanding of leadership skills. Additionally, the specification includes specific modules on safety, SEN, disability sport and inclusivity through adapted activities. The course is worth 16 UCAS points and can be used as a qualification for sports leadership in a paid role. This year we have 39 students completing the

award. The practical element is delivered through their support of core PE lessons, whilst the theory is completed during the 6th form games session.

All these leadership opportunities are tailored to suppor the whole school MY Pb initiative, which is underpinned with

the 6R's. This core strand within our PE delivery is a highly valuable opportunity which is helping shape and develop our students into positive contributors to society, as well as prepare them for the working world.

Girls and Boys Fitness

Fitness club has given students of all years a chance to use the fitness suite and develop their skills and knowledge of how to correctly train their bodies specifically for their sports. This is a club that has run throughout all the winter months and allows student to enjoy the fantastic facilities on offer. Students work independently on fitness progress but also many enjoy the social aspect of coming along to fitness club with friends. We hope to continue this throughout next term.

Multi Sports Club

The multisport club has been an extremely popular extra-curricular club. Regularly, 20+ students have attended each Wednesday after school and enjoyed a wide variety of activities. The purpose of this club is for students to train and participate in these 'alternative sports' in preparation for our bi-termly district competitions, organized by the local SGO (School Games Organizer). There has been outstanding commitment to training from the students who have routinely shown eagerness to learn and compete in these sports including dodgeball, Danish long, korfball, badminton and basketball. Whilst training and competing, students have developed teamwork, responsibility, leadership, communication and empathy.

Outdoor Adventurous Activities

The Outdoor Adventurous Activities (OAA) scheme of work for year 9 and 10 developed started again after October half term. The students have engaged in a range of new challenges from shelter building to fire lighting. This has allowed the students to develop a number of life skills, and has highlighted the importance of a wide array of softer skills such as leadership, self-management, and communication. This term we have seen classes come together to complete a range of tasks including putting up a tent, cooking on a trangia and making a small fire.

Shelter building has seen year 9 students following set instruction to create a range of shelters. This has required independence and resilience from the students, especially for the more challenging shelters. Student have then undertaken a shelters competition, where as a team they create a shelter, using a budget, which is then tested to see how waterproof the shelter is.

Thank you to all the support from other members of staff, allowing the students out of lessons to have the opportunity to attend these events.
