#### **HEADTEACHER'S SPEECH FROM CELEBRATION OF SUCCESS**

"Good evening, and a very warm welcome to our invited guests including parents/carers, members of staff and, very importantly, our prize winners of 2025. Tonight, is a chance to celebrate the success of our prize winners, but also to reflect briefly on the progress made by the school, over the past year – a year that has seen since the 1st of June, Great Marlow School become part of the Marlow Education Trust.

Throughout the year, we have continued to operate the school with our core values of Excellence, Compassion, and Integrity. We are extremely fortunate at this school that staff here, work with great endeavour and creativity to ensure, that the school lives up to its stated ambitions: to be a place where opportunities are created, potential is realised, and excellence is achieved. We are always striving to work, with increasing effectiveness, in partnership with our students, parents/carers, and the local and wider community. This is to achieve our vision of having the highest guality learning environment which inspires our students to be compassionate, successful, and resilient contributors to a better society.

Our curriculum is fundamental to achieving our vision and we are very proud of the broad and rich curriculum that we offer at Key Stage 3 and the excellent range of subjects' students can choose to study at Key Stage 4 and 5. The richness of our curriculum is delivered through, high quality teaching and learning, lesson after lesson, each and every day. In these lessons, students develop their depth of knowledge and understanding, and the essential skills required to apply this knowledge to variety of situations and circumstances.

On the subject of skills, My Personal Best is still a fundamental part of our curriculum within the school focusing on the 6 Rs, of Respect; Readiness: Reflection: Responsibility; Resourcefulness and Resilience. These skills are explicitly developed in students in all individual subjects and lessons as well as in our extensive extra-curricular programme. The 7th R of Reading continues to positively impact on all children's vocabulary and use of language both verbally and written, which will only enhance their performance in all subjects and activities across the school.

All of the Rs are essential skills if our students are going to be compassionate, successful and resilient contributors to creating the better society that we strive for. There is, as we know, far more to life than examinations, but their importance should not be underestimated.

Our broad and rich curriculum, during the main

part of the school day is enhanced



considerably by the extra-curricular programme we offer before and after the main school day and during the weekends and school holidays.

#### Performing arts continues to grow at the school ....

In December, we saw the fantastic stage production of Aladdin, led by Mrs Chenery, Mr Ross, Mrs Brazier and ably supported by Mrs Sharp, with significant support from several other members of staff. The performances will live long in the memories of the many people who saw it. The shows year on year continue to astound the audience and it is amazing to see how assured and confident our students are on stage. Sell outs again, the performances were truly outstanding.

On the subject of the Drama and school productions, this week on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings we have seen the KS3 Pick N Mix production take place. An evening of entertainment showcasing the talents of actors in small sketches, plays, music and movement. Again, as with Aladdin – fantastic performances from students, outstanding acting, that showed maturity way beyond the ages of the performers.

#### MUSIC

Last Wednesday, our Summer Music Concert took place, orchestrated by Mr Kidd and Mr Williams and supported by Mrs Lamming and some of our peripatetic teachers. Students from across all years, with a wide range of musical experience, took part. The Y7 Brass Band did amazingly after only 5 hours to learn how to play their instruments! The eclectic mix of performances ranged through choirs, rock and pop groups, and orchestral pieces. It truly was a showcase for all.

In terms of musical performances this year we have put on a Year 11-13 musical recital at Marlow Church, performed at Marlow Late Night Shopping and also had in December the first Great Marlow School Carol Concert. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mr Kidd and his team and wish Mr Kidd all the best as he takes up a promotion in Derbyshire in September.

#### SPORT

Physical Education, Sport and Physical Activity at GMS is an integral part of the school, the quality of the curricular provision, breadth of sports played, quality of performances continues to grow year on year. As Mr Ford has done in the past, I will make no apology for continuing to talk about the importance of physical activity for physical health and mental wellbeing. As has been mentioned before, in simple terms, physical activity can make you healthier, happier, and brainier!

The sports awards' evening will be held at school tomorrow evening and the rowing awards dinner on Wednesday of next week. The projected combined attendance, again, for both events is in excess of 500 people, this is a true testament to the strength of physical activity and sport at this school.

In the academic year 24/ 25 the PE department have had

501 practice sessions, competed in 358 fixtures. In terms of individual and team successes:

- 3 students representing school in National Athletics Finals
- U18 boys and girls indoor county hockey champions at U18
- U16 girl's county hockey champions
- U12 boys county rugby champions
- U18 girls netball league champions
- District Athletics Champions year 10 girls
- District Athletics runners up year 10/9/8/7 boys
- District Athletics runners up year 8/9 girls
- County Handball Champions year 10 girls!

We have welcomed and competed against schools in the local area but in addition we have also this year welcomed global competition, hosting St Beads Grammar School from Argentina for tour fixtures in both Hockey and Rugby (Great Marlow won them both!).

#### ROWING

Rowing continues to captivate a growing audience at Great Marlow School. The main highlights are that our boys' 1st Eight won The Schools' Head back in March which is a first for GMS and a major land mark event.

Our Year 10 and year 11 boys' fours both won Gold Medals at the Inter Regional Championships in April and went on to win Silver Medals at the National Schools Regatta at the end of May.

Our two eights beat Sir William Borlase in the Marlow Schools Challenge for the fourth year running and our top girls eight qualified for Henley Royal Regatta for the first time ever, while a very young - year 11 and year 10 - boys eight also qualified.

Lower down the school our year 9 girls octo came fourth at the Scullery (National Long Distance time trial) and won the B final at National schools in a dominant style.

The year 8s trained well despite a very wet winter and we have the largest squad to date and also encouraging is the over 90 year 7s who enjoyed the Learn to Row session that have run this term.

#### **DUKE OF EDINBURGH**

The Duke of Edinburgh Award continues to be an important feature of life at GMS, 100 students, 83 bronze and 17 silver from Years 9-13 have successfully completed their awards this year. When you talk about personal development including character development and resilience, this is one fine example. This year, we are particularly grateful to Mr Goodright and members of the PE team for taking this on.

#### **BUSINESS STUDIES**

Business Studies is an incredibly popular subject at GMS at both GCSE and A level, this year the extra-curricular activities have gone from strength to strength with activities throughout the year groups. In particular the Year 10 Young Enterprise teams did Great Marlow School Proud at the regional Young Enterprise event in April achieving a host of second and third prizes in the manufacturing award, Corporate Image, Financial Management, Marketing and an Environmental Award. In addition to this Young Enterprise have been involved in selling products in the local area – both in Marlow and Wycombe. In January Miss Broadbent even got our Year 7's involved with an enterprise event – with the school hall being transformed into a shop for a week! I was even persuaded to buy a plastic red rose...!

#### **VALUES AT GMS**

The compassion of our students, once again, has been clear to see through the charity work that students in all year groups have been involved in this year. We continue to support several local, national, and international organisations including: the One Can Trust who we will be collecting for again, as is tradition, on our final day of term next Friday.

#### Thanks to...

It is at this point I would like to thank every member of school staff for their continued hard work, commitment, and enthusiasm. I would particularly like to thank the members of staff that through their discretionary effort really do go the extra-mile for this school and its students. Mr Ford talked last year about the increasing number of challenges facing society and then in turn schools, there has been no change this year, schools are still taking on the work and responsibilities which once belonged to Social Care, the NHS, the Police or Buckinghamshire Council in our area. This is still without adequate funding and in fact in in real terms funding continues to be reduced.

I want to say a strong public thank you to all of the teachers and associate staff for their work, going above and beyond what is expected to make Great Marlow the place that it is.

I also want to publicly thank the governers who give so willingly of their time, supporting the leadership team but also challenging us to improve the school even further; to the members of Friends of Great Marlow who raise much needed funds to support the school; and to you the parents/ carers who week in week out support us and your children.

Talking of partnerships, we continue to work closely with Marlow FM who have moved into their new accommodation at GMS. A number of staff make regular contributions to the station and students are also getting their opportunity to contribute to the stations content and maybe prepare themselves for a career in the media.

At the end of an academic year, it is the traditional time of

the year when we say goodbye to colleagues who are leaving the school. So, I would like to recognise this evening, as many of them are here.

I would like to thank Mr Vincent who retired after 41 years of service in April. In addition to that I would like to thank Miss Timon as Head of Department, Mrs Sadd and Miss Gronmark for their contributions to the English Department and school as a whole. In addition, from English, Mrs Legerton is leaving, not to retire but to travel, to read and relax and I know her desire is to at some time return to teaching.

As I have previously mentioned Mr Kidd our Head of Music has secured a promotion to a school in Derbyshire, he has raised the profile of music at the school and the quality of performances have been taken to the next level under his leadership.

In addition, we will also be saying goodbye to Mr Merreywether, one of our Assistant Headteachers who will be taking up a promotion as a Deputy Headteacher in a school in Cornwall. His contributions to the leadership of the school, quality of teaching and learning across the school, and to the results and curriculum delivery in Business Studies department have been invaluable.

In addition, we are also saying goodbye to Luca Noviello one of our LSAs and a former student who is leaving to take up the opportunity of a university place in September, and also to Ann Duguid who has supported our Armed Forces students for a number of years.

GMS wish them all the absolute best for the future."

For my final comments, I would like to thank you all, parents, carers, students, staff and guests for attending on this very warm evening. 2024/ 25 has been another fantastic year at Great Marlow School, and I would like to wish all the students a very well-deserved summer break when it arrives on Friday 18th July.

#### GROWING SKILLS AND IDENTITY: YEAR 7 GET CREATIVE WITH NATURE AND CULTURE

Our Year 7 students have made a fantastic start to the year, building on their core art skills and diving into new creative challenges. This term, they've been developing their observational drawing abilities through detailed studies of cacti, learning to measure proportions accurately and apply intricate detail using graphite and watercolour. The results so far have been stunning!

As part of this journey, students have also been exploring markmaking techniques across a variety of media. These techniques not only help bring energy and texture to their artwork but also encourage each student to begin developing their own unique artistic style.

Looking ahead, we're excited to shift the focus to a celebration of personal identity and heritage, inspired by the vibrant and symbolic self-portraits of Frida Kahlo. Known for her depictions of the flora and fauna of her native Mexico, Kahlo's work will guide our students as they create portraits that reflect their own backgrounds. We're inviting them to include plants from their local surroundings or countries of heritage, and they can even include pets that are part of their lives!

To make this even more special, we'll be launching a summer competition to encourage students to go above and beyond with these portraits, there will be exciting prizes for the winners and house points up for grabs for everyone who takes part. It's a fantastic opportunity for students to express who they are through art, and we can't wait to see the creativity and application of all their learning.

#### PUNBELIEVABLE ART! YEAR 8 GET CREATIVE WITH POP AND WORDPLAY

Our Year 8 students have been busy bringing a burst of colour and creativity to the classroom with a vibrant Pop Art project – and the results are nothing short of spectacular! The journey began with refined sweet-themed drawings that explore the core principles of Pop Art while teaching students how to create depth and realism using coloured pencils.

Building on these foundations, students then took inspiration from the bold and playful style of Claes Oldenburg to design and create imaginative sculptures based on idioms and puns. Think clever visual wordplay brought to life in 3D

This project has become a real favourite in the department – not just for the vibrant outcomes, but for the valuable learning it supports. What we especially love is how this project brings out the best in so many of our students. #### EXPLORING IDENTITY THROUGH PORTRAITURE: YEAR 9 DIVE INTO TONE, STYLE, AND SELF-EXPRESSION

Our Year 9 students have been continuing their journey into the world of portraiture, building on their understanding of tone and how it can be expressed through different styles and techniques. Their latest project has taken a bold and exciting turn as they explored the contemporary graphic work of artist Luke Dixon.

Students began by creating impressive artist research pages and producing their own self-portraits inspired by Dixon's distinctive, line-based style. His bold, modern approach provided a striking contrast to the fine art graphite portraits they completed earlier in the year, offering a fresh challenge and a chance to step outside their comfort zones. Some of our student s have also had the opportunity to study Florian Nicolle this term, using collage and watercolour to create a more expressive fine art outcome.

The energy and enthusiasm in the classroom have been fantastic as students embraced this new way of working. Now, they're pushing their creativity even further by experimenting with typography portraits – artworks that combine self-portraiture with carefully selected text. Each piece becomes a celebration of identity, capturing the essence of who they are through both visual design and meaningful words.

For those continuing with GCSE Art next year, this has been a great opportunity to expand their portfolio and explore another stylistic direction. For others, it's a chance to stay engaged and express themselves right through to the end of the school year.

We're incredibly proud of how Year 9 have embraced this project – it's been inspiring to see their confidence grow and their personalities shine through their work. These final pieces are not just portraits, they're powerful personal statements.

The Path of Positivity runs alongside Marlow Football Club, linking Oak Tree Road with Trinity Court. It's a well-used walkway for local residents and students from five of our seven local schools — making it an ideal space to share uplifting artwork and affirmations.

Students from across the community have helped bring this project to life. Other participating schools include Borlase, Holy Trinity, Sandygate, St. Peter's, and Spinfield. Their collective efforts are turning this grey footpath into a source of inspiration for everyone who passes through.

Some of the messages featured on the murals include:

- "Don't let yesterday take up too much of today"
- "Be unique"
- "Believe in yourself"
- "Neurodiverse universe"

These short phrases pack a powerful punch — offering moments of positivity during the daily walk to and from school.

There's more to this project than just paint on a wall. Murals have been shown to boost mental wellbeing, create a stronger sense of place, and even release dopamine in the brain thanks to the use of bold colours (mintandmabel.com). They offer a unique way to connect creativity with emotional health.

The first mural — designed by Charlotte Pearson and Clara Burges — is already complete and ready to view. It's a beautiful example of how young people can shape the spaces around them in meaningful ways. Upcoming murals by Sophia Mills-Miguels and Alana Princivalle are in progress and will be added soon.

#### A Journey Through The Louvre

One of our most popular sessions took students on a virtual tour of The Louvre - showcasing the museum's rich history, iconic architecture, and a world-class collection of masterpieces. It offered a captivating glimpse into the heart of European art and culture.

#### The Art of Skateboarding

This dynamic presentation featured Japanese artist Haroshi, who creates striking sculptures from recycled skateboard decks. Students also explored the Southbank Skatepark, often referred to as the birthplace of British skating, and looked at how designers and artists are transforming skate culture into street art.



Some weekly resources come as video reels set to classical music with expert narration — perfect for passive viewing during tutor time activities like uniform

checks. Others come as PowerPoints designed to encourage discussion, reflection, and creative thinking.

#### **Y12 ASSESSMENT RESULTS - JUNE 2025**

This department offers A-Levels in three subjects: Ancient History, Politics and Law. All y12 students following these subjects sat formal assessments in June.

#### **Ancient History**

Isabelle Berger came top of the class, missing a Grade A by a single mark. Louis Gilmore and Alex Jury came second and third.

#### Politics

Sophie Terrett scored Grade A in both papers and was top of the class. Rudi Chapman came second while Sophie Harris and Abigail Yahahlom were joint third.

#### Law

Classics & Political Sciences

Sophie Terrett achieved Grade A\* in both papers and was top of her class with a score of 94%. Sophie Harris was the top of the other class, also achieving Grade A\* with a score of 91%. Abigail Yahahlom achieved the third best score in the two classes, just missing out on Grade A\* by two marks, while Amelia Giles and Henry Coombs also achieved Grade A scores. In addition, the following achieved a Grade A or A\* score in one of the two papers: Keira Bird, Mia Brown, Louis Gilmore, Bilal Hussain, Alex Jury, Jessica Munro, Bradford Nye, Isabelle Samaras, Daniel Sloan, Barnaby Smith and Isabelle Toppin.





#### YR 7 DESIGN A TROPHY BRIEF

The Year 7's have been making their trophy's this term. During the process, students make a detailed activity mind-map, draw a trophy design to scale with accurate measurements and analyse a trophy in detail. During the practicals, the students use a hacksaw to cut the steel, a hammer to bend the steel and file to make chamfered domes. The pieces are brazed together then dip dyed red. This is a great example of a student's trophy where she did a great job sanding her base with the belt sander and using the stamps to make a metal name plate.

#### YEAR 9 GRAPHICS - DESIGNING THE FUTURE: A JOURNEY INTO 3D DRAWING AND CARD ROBOTICS

Year 9 students have been embarking on an exciting creative journey that blended technical drawing with hands-on model making. Through a dedicated course in 3D drawing and isometric design, students developed a strong foundation in visualising and representing objects from different angles—a key skill in both engineering and design.

The project culminated in a challenge: to design, plan, and construct their own card robots. Armed with their new understanding of isometric drawing, students sketched detailed concepts, refined their ideas through planning, and brought them to life using craft knives, card, rulers, creativity, and plenty of problem-solving.

Not only did this project showcase students' creative design abilities, but it also encouraged critical thinking, perseverance, and innovation. Each robot reflected a unique personality some were futuristic and sleek, others bold and mechanical—all demonstrating the impressive growth in the students' technical drawing and model-making skills.



The end results will emerge in the last week of the year, and will reflect the challenges they overcame along the way. It's a fantastic celebration of effort, imagination, and hands-on learning.

We're very proud of our Year 9s for their creativity and dedication, and are very excited for the creative development of those students who have opted to move into Design & Technology for one of their GCSEs.

#### Year 9 Drama Students Explore the Art of Set **Design and Stage Makeup**

In the ever-evolving world of theatre, the ability to transform oneself into a character goes beyond acting—it extends to the art of technical theatre and the skills needed to bring together a vision on stage, using light, set, costume and make up.

This year we have introduced some new additions to the topics studied in Year 9 Drama. Due to our ever-popular GCSE Drama course providing curriculum opportunities in sound and lighting design, costume and stage makeup, we have created a curriculum that introduces our students to some of the technical elements available to them on our GCSE courses.

We have looked at set and stage design by using a brief and creating small scale cut out set boxes that tell a story using set. We also looked at designing costumes for our favourite character's that reinvented the role into a contemporary design, discussing the use of fabric, tailoring, colours, practicalities and personality.

> Our most popular area of design was stage makeup. For our Year 9 drama students, delving into stage makeup offered a unique opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of theatrical design and allowed all students to develop new skills that are valuable both on and off the stage.

> To solidify their understanding, students participated in practical sessions where they learnt stage makeup techniques. Activities included applying makeup to create different characters and to tell a story, understanding how makeup interacts with stage lighting, and learning the importance of hygiene and safety when using makeup products.

The students underwent stage by stage training in how to apply the makeup, what tools to use and how to create specific effects using a variety of professional products.

The students worked incredibly hard together in their working groups in creating their outcomes and the drama department were so pleased by their approach and confidence with this new skill.

Well done to you all and we look forward to continuing with this with the next cohort.

#### HISTORY TRIP TO HAMPTON COURT PALACE

Our Year 12 A-level History students recently visited Hampton Court Palace as part of their early modern studies. Throughout the day, students explored the palace grounds and discovered how it became a centre of power during Henry VIII's reign and beyond.

In the morning, a Hampton Court Palace expert led an engaging session on the mid-Tudor Crisis, using the palace itself as a valuable historical source. Students enthusiastically participated, drawing on the architecture and original sources around them to enrich group discussions and deepen their understanding of this pivotal period in history.

During our visit, we discovered that Hampton Court Palace is distinctly divided into two sections: the original Tudor buildings and the later Georgian additions, the latter inspired by the grandeur of the Palace of Versailles. We also learned many fascinating historical details about the palace such as it was under Wolsey and how it has changed today. For example, many of the 241 chimneys are merely decorative and added later to 're-Tudor' the palace.

We also were able to visit Wolsey's apartments and view some significant painting that are part of the Royal Palaces collection such as the Field of Cloth of Gold and the Batlle of Spurs. We also viewed some artefacts from Wolsey's apartments, tried on some Tudor headwear and learnt how the astronomical clock works that dominates clock court.

A highlight of the day for the students was Hampton Court's historic maze which I they completed in record time, despite the heat. (Although the final standings on finishers have been disputed by some participants).

#### SPIRITED ARTS COMPETITION



The Spirited Arts project is now in its fourth year at Great Marlow School and is an integral part of the Key Stage 3 Religious Education curriculum, delivered as the final topic in Summer Term of Year 8. It is an international project run by the National Association of RE Teachers (NATRE), attracting thousands of entries from students of all ages and locations. At GMS, it gives all students the opportunity to apply their learning from years 7 and

8 to three different themes provided. This year the themes were 'Living in a Diverse World, 'Thinking about God' and 'Making Sense of Life'.



Students have worked in small groups since returning from Easter plan and implement their own learning, conducting research into relevant religious beliefs and scriptural evidence. The have a largely free choice over what kind of creative, artistic work we want to produce. In 2025, we have had short films, poems, paintings, photography and even cakes (see below). Each group then needs to produce a piece of reflective writing to analyse and evaluate their project, considering questions such as 'My inspiration came from...' and 'I have discovered...'.

In each of the nine year 8 classes, a gold, silver and bronze certificate will be awarded for the best entries, looking at both their artwork and subsequent write-up. From these 27 winning entries, the year 8 teaching team (Mr Pightling, Mrs Todd and Mr Yasin) will choose the ten overall best entries that we can send off to the national competition.

It is clear the students value this project. Loca Bogue (8H3) said "Spirited Arts helps your creativity when thinking about Religious Education." Ollie Cook 8H1 also remarked that "Spirited Arts has helped me explore my own religion."

This year, the feedback from the exams team was overwhelmingly positive. They praised the maturity and responsibility demonstrated by our students – one invigilator said to me that she had 'never seen a Year 10 group like it'. This feedback was enormously gratifying and

I have had some questions from parents regarding mock exam results and where they should expect their children's grades to be at this point in Year 10. The key thing to remember here is that your child is now just passed the halfway point of their GCSE studies. They still have 8-9 months of lessons, assessments, feedback, revision and exam practice to prepare for their 'real' GCSE exams. If your child is at all disappointed in their mock exam results, they should concentrate on the feedback more than the grade itself. There is time to improve grades if the work is put in!

#### ACADEMIC PROGRESS AND MOCK EXAMS

This year, our Year 10 students rose to the challenge of their first set of mock exams. Their focus, determination, and willingness to act on feedback has been commendable. Many students have shown outstanding progress across subjects, and their positive attitude towards revision and exam preparation bodes well for the year ahead. Staff have praised the group for their engagement in lessons and their developing independence as learners.

#### WORKPLACE EXPERIENCE

One of the standout highlights this year was the successful completion of work experience placements. Students impressed a wide range of employers with their professionalism, work ethic, and ability to adapt to new environments. # Athletics 2025

The 2025 athletics season has seen a huge number of athletes take to the track and field, fuelled by motivation to continue their domination of athletics in the district.

Once again, this season provided students with the opportunity to compete against other schools in three separate team competitions; the District Athletics Championships, the District Athletics League and the ESAA Track and Field Cup.

#### **ESAA Track and Field Cup**

A nationally run, team competition, where students must compete in one track and one field event. Competitors earn points for their team dependant on their time, distance or height achieved. The teams with the highest total points win/qualify for latter rounds.

#### Junior girls - 342 points

The Junior girls surpassed expectations this year by claiming the 3rd highest points total in Buckinghamshire behind Wycombe Abbey and Dr Challoners, which qualified them for the Regional 'B' Final, where they finished in 3rd place. A Junior Girls team at GMS has never placed in a regional final before, and in the process of doing so, the girls scored the highest GMS Junior Girls total ever.

#### Inter girls - 288 points

The Inter Girls had a disappointing outing, as they were not able to hit their 300-points target. The team were hampered by injuries, which meant some last-minute tweaks to the team were required and they were just unable to produce the brilliant performances we are so used to seeing from them. The girls finished 5th in Buckinghamshire, however, were still highest finishing nongrammar/private school in the competition, which is something to be proud of.

#### Junior boys - 442 points

The Junior Boys finished with the 2nd highest total points in Buckinghamshire, once again pipped to top spot by local rivals John Hampden Grammar School. The Junior Boys became the first ever GMS team to qualify for a Regional 'A' Final, where they finished in 3rd place. The highest placing of a GMS team in the school's history. On their way to finishing 3rd in the Midlands, they boys also claimed the highest GMS Junior Boys total ever.

#### Inter boys - 450 points

The Inter Boys, much like the Junior Boys, finished with the 2nd highest total points in Buckinghamshire,

qualifying for the Regional 'B' Final in the process. At the final, the team put in some outstanding individual performances, which enabled them to achieve the 6th highest score in the country out of all 'B' finalists, and attain the highest points total ever, of any GMS team. As if all these accolades weren't enough, the boys also went on the win the Midlands 'B' Final. Again, a first for a GMS team.

#### **District Athletics Championships**

A local, team competition, for schools in the Wycombe District. Schools may enter two athletes per event, per team. Individuals may compete in a maximum of 2 track, 1 field and a relay, or 2 field, one track and a relay. Athletes earn points for their team based on their final placing.

The GMS teams took to their respective District Championships, confident and determined to continue their reputation as one of the most dominant schools in the district. The teams did just that, by placing in the top two for every single team except two, who both finished their respective competitions in 3rd place.

Congratulations to our Year 10 girls' team, who won their District Championships. Unwilling to experience the disappointment they'd felt at the Track and Field Cup, the girls really stepped up to blow all other competition out of the water.

Overall, our combined girls' points total finished them as District Champions for the fourth year running, once again beating schools such as Wycombe Abbey, Pipers Corner, Borlase and Wycombe High in the process. Their final total was 552 points, beating 2nd placed Pipers Corner by a whopping 154 points. It is likely that even Pipers had entered an extra team, this still wouldn't have been enough to catch the GMS total.

The boys' team finished in 2nd place, behind John Hampden, with a total of 566 points, but going one better than last year by beating RGS's combined total by 53 points.

Accumulatively, with all boys' and girls' results combined, GMS finished as the 1st placed co-ed school in the district with 1118 points, smashing last year's total by exactly 100 points. It turns out, that our only real coed competitors are ourselves, with no local mixed boys' and girls' schools offering any real competition in recent years. The second placed co-ed school, High Crest, were 620 points behind the Great Marlow teams, and third placed Borlase, a crushing 704 points to the deficit.

As a department we have been working with Year 11 Embrace Leadership in the PE Life Skills Award

This year, GMS PE introduced the Physical Education Life Skills Award to our Year 11 core PE curriculum — and it has already proven to be a resounding success.

The award is designed to help students develop key life competencies such as communication, teamwork, resilience, and organisation. These skills are demonstrated through the planning and delivery of PE lessons to their own form group. In small teams, students are assigned a teaching space — often one they've selected themselves — and are responsible for designing and running a full session.

Following each lesson, both the class and the teacher provide structured feedback, focusing on the specific Life Skill keywords the group set out to demonstrate. Over the course of the year, students typically deliver around six lessons, with their final award level — Bronze, Silver, Gold or Platinum — determined by the range and consistency of competencies shown.

We're incredibly proud to report a 98% pass rate in this inaugural year, with students showing exceptional creativity and innovation in the activities they delivered. The programme has been well received by both staff and students alike, and many participants have expressed a keen interest in progressing to the Level 3 Sports Leaders Course in Sixth Form next year.

The Life Skills Award not only enhances leadership and confidence but also lays a strong foundation for continued development in sport, education, and beyond.

# Great Weekend for GMSBC at Junior Inter-Regional Regatta

# This weekend we took three fours/quads up to Nottingham for the Junior Inter-Regional Regatta on Saturday.

Our J16 (year 11 boys) coxed four was one of the first races of the day which meant an early 5 am departure for them.

As with many major regattas the event started with a time trial to seed the finals. The Time trial was over 1000m which was shorter than the side by side finals and made for tight time differences at the top of each event.

The boys put down the fastest time in their time trial, just under 2 seconds ahead of second place. Having said this, they came off the water feeling comfortable and not over stretched so looking in a good position for later in the day.

We then had quiet a wait for the rest of the squad to arrive, so I went off to track down the Master in Charge of rowing at Westminster School , who organise the Schools Head of the River.

Much to my joy, not only was he attending the regatta but also had our winners Pennant and medals from the Boys First Eight winning this year's Schools Head – School First Eights trophy. This a significant first in GMSBC history and only the fourth time we have won any event at Schools Head. (Photos of winning crew with Medals to Follow)

Back to the regatta and our J15 boys coxed four were next up. They had a solid row but a couple of wobbles and a crab meant they felt there was room for improvement. When results came out, they were second in the time trial 3.5 seconds off first. Which while significant was by no means ruling out a much-wanted Gold.

The WJ16 girls quad was our last crew to race and looking to improve on their scullery result from last term. The short distance in fast conditions made times very tight at the top of their event with under 2 seconds between 4th , where they came and 2nd. So a tight and exciting final ahead.

The finals followed the same order and our J16 boys lined up as favourites on the start line. Regular readers may remember that this crew, won a nail-biting Gold at National Schools last year, coming from last place after 250m to winning Gold in the last 5 strokes of the race. Coach had given a race plan that hopefully saved his heart rate a bit and meant a more aggressive first half. Out of the blocks, GMS were up with the fastest three boats, but a Kingston Grammar School four in lane 2 made an early push to try to establish a lead. However, by 500m their push was fading and GMS took the lead shortly afterwards. To be honest, from there on in there was a neck and neck race for the other medals but Gold was never in doubt and the GMS boys opened a several length lead to win in fine style.

The year 10s, while not quite as confident, starting in lane 4 as the second fastest crew, still had high ambitions.

Through to 500m there was not much between the first three or four, but with 600m gone GMS put down a strong push to open a <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> length lead on the field and then with confidence of seeing the field behind them, settled into a powerful rhythm and maintained this lead through to the last 250m.

Strong finishes from both trailing medal contenders definitely challenged the GMS boys but their lead was too great to be overcome. So, two events two golds.

Our very successful WJ16 girl's quad was one of the last races of the day and from the tt we knew it would be tight. The Scottish crew, who were clearly faster in the tt, lead the field pretty much from the off, but the next four boats were neck and neck with half a length across the four. Leads and margins were changing all the way through the second half of the race and on this occasion they finished just outside the medals. I am sure we will see more from them in the weeks ahead.

A great day, with some super results. Sunday saw two GMS boys, Ethan Hunt and Connor Quann, competing at the GB small boats regatta, which is the penultimate stage of the GB selection process. Both boys competed well, making the top 30 athletes in the UK, but at this stage are unlikely to progress to final crew formation.

#### Bedford Regatta-lots of wins and two cups!

One of the highlights of the early summer regatta season is this charming regatta. It is an old-fashioned knock out **5** competition with many events having four rounds to reach the final. We took seven crews to Bedford Amateur Regatta and virtually every rower won at least one race.

There is so much more fun in a side-by-side duel and all the major schools are generally represented here making the competition excellent.

Our year 10 girls were off first, having arrived at 0745, and luck of the draw meant our A crew drew a very strong Headington Crew and the eventual winners in their first round so had a quick exit, but the B quad had an excellent race against locals Bedford Modern to win by 3 lengths and had a good race in the quarter finals to narrowly lose to St Mary's School.

Then came the year 10 boys. The B four had an excellent race against Abingdon School and although they were out matched, rowed well through out the race and kept the pressure on their opponents. The A boat were lucky enough to have a Bye,

Fortunately, those rowers who had lost their first race were mainly entered into a second event. In the year 10 girls case it was a coxed four (sweep) as opposed to a quad(sculling) , In their first race they met Lady Eleanor Holles and had a nail-biting race. As the course is around a long bend, the start is staggered, so the inside crew is behind for most of the race even if they are going faster. In our WJ15 4+'s case they were  $\frac{1}{2}$  a length down with 300m to go and then they met a wall of cheering from the GMS parents and with cries from cox Isabel Berger to " go faster" they found inner resolve to push through the opposition to win by 1/3 length. In their next round against Brentford RC, they were on the outside of the bend and had a poor start, giving the opponents a lot of the stagger back. By halfway Brentford had still more advantage to come and had a length advantage. The result looked cast, but the GMS girls dug in deep and fought back hard. Despite being on the outside lane around the bend the margin was decreasing and with 200m left  $\frac{1}{2}$  a length was all that was in it. That was the eventual result but an excellent race from these competitive girls.

The two boys' fours combined to race as a eight and had a comfortable victory over Bedford Modern in their first race, The second round against Radley, who had beaten Eton in the first round, was always going to be tough but the boys hung in well and raced well to still be in touch by the end.

Now just a very quick summary of our two winning crews. The J18 4x (boys 6th form Quad) had the easiest day, not having to arrive till 4:00 pm and racing their final at18:41



they had two races which they dominated and GMS picked up the J18 4x trophy for the second year running. In Contrast the J15 4+, who arrived at 0800 and had to race 6 races despite a bye in their first round, lined up for their final at 1917 against Bedford School.

In getting to this point, two Eton crews, two Abingdon Crews, A crew from St Georges College and others had all been beaten.

Being the final, the boys expected a tough race and starting a length down on the inside of the bend, they were not sure whether they would ever see their opponents (rowers look backwards!). They need not have worried, by halfway they had drawn level and with plenty of advantage still to come they pushed on through and while it seemed the crews were well matched, the GMS boys had a better run on the boat and kept moving through to win the final by 2 lengths.

A really fun day out on the river, with something for all the rowers, but always a thrill to take on the big independent schools and win.



# **National Schools Regatta**

The weekend of half term 29th-30th May, saw some fifty plus GMSBC rowers competing at the National Schools Regatta up at the National Water Sports Centre in Nottingham.

The event is meant to be divide into three separate days racing with year 9s and 10s on the Friday then older crews on the weekend, with the top J18( sixth form/ championship) crews racing over both days.

Sadly due to very high winds forecast for Sunday, the third day was cancelled making for a somewhat curtailed regatta.

# **Friday**

We arrived around 0830 at Nottingham to find a perfect day with next to no wind and bright sunshine. The time trials all went off well and results were pretty much a fair reflection of each crew performance. The crews are seeded into A,B, C and D finals based on their time trial results with anyone outside the top 24 no longer involved in the regatta. All our crews made it through to the side by side stage and it was now a question of how well they could go in the finals.

The year 9 boys , who just missed out on a final at Junior Sculling Regatta were very pleased to have made it through this time. They were supposedly second fastest from the TT in their final and went out with a strategy to go one better. They had a strong start and made a determined push going into the 500m mark( half way for year 9s). They were in first position with a quarter length lead over second place. Unfortunately, they caught a crab which stopped the boat briefly and by the time they were up and running they had lost most of a length. Nothing daunted, they set to overhaul Peterborough in first place and over the next 250m closed significantly. The trend was definitely going in the right direction but sadly they ran out of track and had to settle for second, but a great race from these boys.

The year 9 girls octo were part of a deep field of 25 crews entered into this event. For year 9s this is the blue riband event. With the lake being so busy, they weren't able to get in a proper warm up for their time trial, which resulted in them finishing a slightly disappointing 9th, putting them in the B final. Their day improved dramatically in their side by side race; they got off to a great start, and led the field by 3 seconds at the 500m mark. Eton Excelsior in second place mounted a strong challenge as they approached the finish, but the girls kept their composure, and rowed away with a strong cohesive rhythm to win their race by just under a length. This boat is full of talented, dedicated athletes, who have made great strides together, both in and out of the boat

The year 10 girls were in the A and B quad sculls events, with the A crew in their D final and the Bs in the B final. Like the year 9s the A crew were a little disappointed in their ranking but went out to enjoy their final. It was a nail biter from the word go. Northwich went out fast and took an early lead of half to a length up by 500m. With a strong second 500m from GMS and Trentham, the lead had changed and GMS was now in second place. These two crews continued to move on in the third quarter and with 500m to go they both had clear water on third place and the crews were level. Momentum though was with the GMS girls and a really tough last 500m saw them cross the line a length up on Trentham in second place.

The B crew had done really well to make the B final but this meant a tough race in the side by side and they improved their ranking from 12th to 11th in their side by side.

The year 10 boys were both in coxed fours (sweep as opposed to sculling) but there was no "B" event so it was a tough ask for the second four to make the side by side finals. As it was they were second fastest qualifier for the D final and lined up looking forward to challenging for the top place in their race.

The boys attacked from the start and with 500m gone had half a length on second placed St Georges College. There was no looking back for the crew after this and with a big push at 750m they opened up a clear water lead and continued to move away from the rest of the field, winning their race by over 12 seconds from second place. Their time would have won the B final. A really exciting row from these boys and made them proud of their achievement.

The A crew had heavy expectations on their shoulders. GMS has won gold in this event for the last two years but this year a very strong Westminster Eight (4th in Champioship eights at the Schools Head) had decided to race as two fours. In the time trial the GMS boat came in first place with Brentford in Second and Westminster in 3rd and 6th position(some 9 seconds behind GMS) so all looked favourable but by no means certain.

By this stage in the regatta there was a steady cross head which while not ruining the lanes , gave a definite advantage to lane 6 in a more sheltered position.

The boys had a good start and looked to moving nicely but the slower Westminster crew from the TT in lane 6 had an even better start and at 500m lead by a third of a length over GMS in second Place. Again a strong second 500 from GMS saw them briefly draw level, but Westminster held on to regain their marginal advantage. With 500m left the Westminster crew in lane 6 had a half length lead over GMS and the stronger Westminster crew in lane 3 had closed to within half a length in third place.

While all crews were upping the rate and pushing hard for the finish line the distances were creeping narrower but the race track was running out. A really great race and a very well deserved Silver Medal in what was a top class field.

# Saturday

As mentioned , an early decision not to race on Sunday meant a rescheduling of Saturdays racing with all

events proceeding from time trial to finals. With A finals first then Bs etc.

The first of our crews to race was the top girls quad. Fortunately we had decided to not race the year 11s in their age group as this event ended up being cancelled due to scheduling. This meant we could field a stronger top boat with two year 11s in the crew.

They had a solid row and were a little disappointed to slip into the D final, but luckily a faster crew scratched, elevating them to C. In their side by side, the conditions were by now very tough and the lanes distinctly not even so they did well to improve their ranking by one slot coming 5th in their race.

They were shortly followed by the top boys. The protracted time trial taking over 20 minutes to complete the whole list meant that very varying conditions saw some very unusual candidates in higher finals. Having had a good run into this regatta, we knew it would be tough to make the A final as there are about half a dozen crews of very comparable standard. It is a sign of the increasing standard of competition that there was only 3.6 seconds between racing in the A final and being in the C final. We then had a boys B J18 quad and two girls B quads, with the boys coming 10th in their tt, the girls coming 3rd and 7th respectively.

A good race in the boys quad saw them climb to 9th overall in the ranking, while the girls came 5th and the second boat had to scratch due to injury.

Last but not least was our J16 boys coxed four. They were defending their Gold medal from last year and came in second place in the TT behind a very strong Kew House crew 4.5 seconds a head of them. They started well and followed the race plan, leading by a few feet a 500m. A tough second 500m saw Kew House take the lead. While this crew famously came back from over a length down to win gold last year, this was not going to happen as Kew House proved too strong. The GMS pacing could not be faulted though as they managed to negative split every 500 ( got faster through the race) with 1:55.42, 1:53.60, 1:51.64 and 1:51.38. Following on the heels of last years Gold, Silver was well earned and something to be very proud of.

A slightly frustrating regatta due to weather and some not quite optimal results but another year coming home with Major Medals is continuing our upward trend.

A disappointing outcome for this crew.

#### **Maidenhead Regatta**

Another sunny, exciting day of racing on the Thames over this past weekend. Three crews journeyed to Maidenhead Regatta: two Year 9 Quads and a Year 10 Boys' Quad.

The format of the regatta tries to ensure most crews row in two races at least. Our Year 9 girls met Windsor Girls School in the fist round and had a fairly comfortable win, they looked strong and well-coordinated. In the second round they met a powerful squad, Eton Excelsior, who were a little over zealous at the start but made ground their early "go". While this meant our girls were down at the start, they rowed well and kept their form for the most part and, indeed, in the middle of the race started to pull towards the Excelsior crew. A good race ensued but Excelsior held on to win. The girls were pleased to have won the earlier race and knew that they had performed well in the later one.

The Year 9 boys, sadly, were granted a bye through to the semi-finals meaning they went straight up against a strong crew and while they held together well and kept to the better form they have been working on recently, they were not able to win this time.

The Year 10 boys had the longest day with an early first race in the morning, but by virtue of winning this they progressed to the semi final at 3:10. Here they met Borlase and a reasonably close race ensued, but the GMS boys had winning in mind and pushed ahead over the course to move into the final.

It meant they went straight back to the start for the final. They began aggressively to leave competition behind and maintained a strong pace over the course to take the overall title.

A really good win for these Year 10 boys.

# **Marlow Town Regatta**

As always, a busy day for GMSBC with 90 students racing in over 40 races. The day was beautiful weather, but the strong wind made the conditions challenging, even for our top crews, with fairly lumpy water.

Year 8s had their first regatta and performed well. The boys quad lead their race to half way but sadly caught a bad crab at the church which allowed the two Marlow RC crews to overtake them. Nothing daunted they reset themselves and set off in pursuit. It was a big gap to close, but they managed it in part by overhauling one of the Marlow crews to come second. I think we will see a lot more from these boys in the future.

The boys octo were again racing Marlow Rowing club, and rowing up to the start looked the stronger crew. Sadly, the Marlow crew had a breakage before the race meaning our octo had no opposition but rowed over to take their first win and Medals.

The girls also did a quad and an octo and here there was a little more depth in the competition, with Headington School also competing. The Octo had a great race in the heat to win and make it through to the final beating one Headington crew in the process.

In the final they were not quite as cohesive in the choppy water as a very well drilled Headington top boat but came second.

Year 9 boys did a combination of Doubles and quads and had a number of close races in the doubles, but their main success was in the quad, where having made it to the final, were leading coming into the enclosures but a big wash caught a blade and this lead to a break in their rhythm allowing the Borlase crew to take a small lead, Although the challenged hard over the last 50m they were unable to get their bows in front.

The main race for the girls was in their octo which has had some great racing this year, winning the B final at National Schools in a convincing row. They were up against a very strong Headington crew who had beaten them before. The girls put in a spirited race, but the Headington crew which will have had considerably more time on the water this season coped better with the rough conditions.

Year 10 Girls were in our earlier races with Lily Nickless and Georgina Greening both making the final in singles (WJ15 1x) and in a repeat of Marlow Spring Lily took the win in an impressive victory over a field including so strong Headington girls.

Year 10 boys raced well in double, two quads and an eight. The smaller boats all had good races, with one of the quads making it through to the final. We had put out to reasonably matched quads, rather than a 1st and 2nd boat, so in the final the GMS boat came second but were no match for the Marlow top quad.

In the eight, the boys had a straight final against Abingdon School first and second J15 eights. The boys had not been in the eight for quite a while and this showed off the start where Abingdon 1st boat took a quick 3/4 length lead but over the rest of the race, the GMS crew started to eat away at this lead. As the race rounded the bend into the enclosures GMS were losing by a few feet but were moving faster. The spectators had to wait for some minutes to hear the result but sadly the verdict went to Abingdon, however a great race for our eight against top class opposition.

The year 11 boys four had a scrappy row and came off the water feeling they could have done so much better, but they had still won convincingly over the Abingdon Opposition.

The main events of the regatta are obviously the Marlow Schools Challenge Races.

These all went to form with the boys' quads being the first race- GMS took a short lead off the start but the Borlase crew were determined to make a race of it and as they came into the enclosures GMS only had a half-length on SWB. A close race and a good showing from our opposition.

The girl's quad was next and Borlase have been stronger all year at the various National events. A 3-length victory was a solid performance by them and hopefully keeps them coming back for more next year.

In the eights races, the two that really get the crowd shouting in the enclosures the girls came down first, with GMS leading by a length of clear water and looking very dominant.

In the boys' race was a similar story with the verdict never in doubt and GMS won both eight races yet again.
